Steven Mickel is requesting donations of casual clothing for prisoners just released from prison. Leave them in the Narthex. *Thanks!*






Grace and peace to you all from the risen Lord!

I am going to share with you a very interesting piece of history related to Riverside. As a pastor under the itinerant system, I do not get to choose where I live. Riverside was not my plan, but God's. I had never heard of it before Bishop Sano appointed me there over two decades ago, and I have lived there the longest, even longer than in my hometown of Seoul, Korea. Unbeknownst to me, Riverside has a deep root for Korean immigrants.

American Presbyterian and Methodist missionaries came to Korea around 1884. The missionaries provided avenues to migrate and work on pineapple and sugar plantations in Hawaii. For this reason, half of the first immigrants in 1903 were Christians. As soon as they arrived, they began worshipping together. In 1905, the first Korean Methodist Church in Honolulu, presently known as Christ UMC, was chartered. After Japan illegitimately annexed Korea in 1910, resistance and independence became a focal point for Korean immigrants.

With this sentiment in the background, Chang Ho Ahn and his wife arrived in San Francisco in October 1902. His friends who worked on citrus farms in Riverside encouraged him to come, so he and his wife moved to Riverside in 1904. Ahn established the Korean Labor Bureau, which contributed to an influx of Korean workers and formed a community of up to 300 Koreans on Pachappa (currently Cottage) Street. There were only 800 Koreans on the mainland, not counting Hawaii, during that time. Immigration scholars, including the city of Riverside, believe it was the first Korean community in the US. Edward Chang, a UCR professor, calls it the first Koreatown in the US in his book, "Pachappa Camp." The Calvary Presbyterian Church in Riverside established a mission there in 1906. The Riverside Enterprise



wrote, "The Korean mission . . . has only been established a year, but is a strong organization. A majority of the members are converts from the mission in Korea." The Great Freeze in 1913 devastated the citrus industry in California and forced Koreans to look for work elsewhere. Otherwise, the Korean community in Riverside would have thrived.

While in Riverside, Ahn taught English, led Bible studies, formed the Korean National Association, drafted the constitution, and pioneered the independence movement from Japanese colonization. To Koreans, Ahn is analogous to Thomas Jefferson or George Washington. Edward Chang claims Riverside was the birthplace of modern democratic Korea. Ahn went to Shanghai, China, to establish a provisional government and was appointed premier until 1921. He had been through several tortures and imprisonment by the Japanese. While in prison, the Japanese police demanded he give up his independence struggle, and Ahn's answer was, "No, I cannot. When I eat, I eat for Korean independence. When I sleep, I sleep for Korean independence. This will not change as long as I live." He was released in 1937 from prison, but his health was severely deteriorated from the imprisonment. He developed severe illnesses and died in March, 1938.

Ahn's legacy lives on. The Dosan Ahn Chang Ho Memorial was built in downtown Riverside in 2001. Now, Korean communities are raising \$50 million to build a cultural center in Riverside to tell the story of Ahn and modern-day Korea. Another Ahn memorial is in Gangnam, Seoul, which is Riverside's sister city.

This history is a testament to the power of the Gospel. So many American missionaries, influenced by the third great spiritual awakening in America came to Korea and awakened the once-a-heathen nation, raised people like Ahn, and planted invaluable seeds for Korea today. My prayer is that the Lord will bring another great awakening here in America.




